The City of Winnipeg operates three municipal golf courses, Crescent Drive, Kildonan Park and Windsor Park Golf Course. In addition to these, there are private clubs, bringing the total number of golf facilities within and outside the city to 20.

Expanding the scope to the surrounding Royal Municipalities, golfers have access to a broader selection, including 8 private golf clubs and 16 municipal and 110 public clubs, totaling 125 golf facilities in the region.

This variety ensures that golfers in the Winnipeg area have ample opportunities to enjoy the sport across different settings and course types.

- Kildonan Park: A heated leisure pool with a diving board and accessibility facilities

- Provencher: Free Admission, unheated with a diving board
- St Vital: A heated leisure pool with a diving board and accessibility facilities
- Transcona Aquatic Park: A heated leisure pool with an accessible beach area featuring spray features and a diving board.
- Westdale: A heated leisure pool with a beach area.
- Windsor Park: Free admission, unheated with ladder entry.

These facilities offer a range of programs, including swimming lessons, recreational swims, and special events.
