The Cedars Cancer Foundation was founded in 1966 and has evolved from a hospital-based fund supporting the Royal Victoria Hospital to an independently registered charity in 2008. Motivated by the complex needs of cancer patients and their families, Cedars is determined to grow bigger and stronger year over year. To that end, its teams of professionals and volunteers work tirelessly to raise the funds required to support exceptional patient care, research, education, and support services for cancer patients. The Foundation distributes its revenues to the McGill University Health Centre (MUHC), including the Cedars Cancer Centre, Sarah's Floor/Hematology-Oncology Division of the Montreal Children's Hospital, and the Cancer Research Program of the Research Institute of the MUHC. The Foundation is also a founding partner of the Rossy Cancer Network.

At the leading edge

It is our privilege to recognize the Cedars Cancer Foundation's 2018-2019 results and acknowledge that without constant and generous community support, it would be very difficult, if not impossible, to be at the leading edge of cancer care, research and education.

Why is this so important? At present, over 20,000 cancer patients are counting on the expertise of 14 tumour-site groups for complete and integrative therapies and services, including precision medicine, state-of-the-art technologies and access to clinical trials. The multidisciplinary teams of the McGill University Health Centre are motivated by a deep sense of responsibility to these patients. We believe patients deserve access to specialized and ultra-specialized services that will give them the best outcomes and quality of life; they deserve at team that's at the leading edge.

Being at the leading edge requires more research into the unique causes of each type, grade and stage of cancer; more screening and detection tools; faster uptake of innovative technologies; and experts in genomics, proteomics, artificial intelligence, nanotechnologies, computational medicine and other specialty fields. It also takes more collaboration to speed up the translation of discoveries into lifesaving therapies, drugs and vaccines, and to train students, residents and fellows.

MUHC Cancer Care Mission

With the opening of the Cedars Cancer Centre in 2015, a new era of comprehensive patient-centred care was launched in Montreal at the McGill University Health Centre's Glen site. Integrating almost all cancer care under one roof, the clinic structure is based on multidisciplinary patient care.

The Cedars Cancer Centre is an extremely busy hub for cancer care at the MUHC and for patients across the Rossy Cancer Network and RUISSS McGill. It is home to an Oncology Day Centre with 50 spacious treatment stations with window views, oncology pharmacy and test centre, urgent care centre, Palliative Care Day Hospital, dedicated oncology medical imaging department, radiation-oncology department with 8 linear accelerator bunkers and two brachytherapy suites, a tranquility garden, as well as on-site resource centre and social workers to offer health information and support.

This high volume of specialized and ultra-specialized care environment receives approximately 175,000 visits annually. Nearly 800 patients per day in medical oncology, hematologic oncology, radiation oncology, as well as palliative and supportive care. With cutting-edge technologies, professionals continue to be pioneers in cancer diagnosis, treatments, drugs, and vaccines.

Sarah's Floor & Pediatric Hematology-Oncology

Sarah's Floor is a 12-room inpatient unit and Day Centre, named in honour of Sarah Cook, an Ewing's Sarcoma survivor who created Sarah's Fund at Cedars with her parents Lorena and Norman Cook.

Since its inception, Sarah's Fund at Cedars has raised over \$12 million. Sarah's Floor is the hub of the MUHC's Division of Pediatric Hematology-Oncology where teams provide complex care, including chemotherapy and adjuvant monoclonal antibody drugs, transfusions of blood products, and assessment and treatment of symptoms such as pain, nausea and vomiting, infection and psychological distress.

Sarah's Floor and the Day Centre are serene and home-like settings, complete with library, television and game room, and other family services. Patients and their families benefit from the humanitarian services that aid those in need of financial assistance. Young cancer patients and their families also profit from pet and music therapy, comfort kits that are generously donated by Jellifish Kids and 'The Bell' Fund, Dr. Clown therapy and nursing education. All these services help improve the patients' healing process and make their stay on Sarah's Floor a little more comfortable.

Thankfully, donors to Sarah's Fund for Cedars help immensely with this burden and help put smiles on the faces of over 7,000 of our youngest cancer patients.

Sarah's Fund for Cedars has also made a commitment of \$1 million over five years to the Montreal Children's Hospital Terry Fox Precision Oncology for Young People (PROFYLE). Leading Montreal Children's Hospital researcher Dr. Nada Jabado is taking part in this major national research program, that aims to transform the care of children and young adult patients who are currently living with a refractory, relapsed, or metastatic cancer. PROFYLE will help to identify treatment by using next-generation molecular tools and cancer model systems, to identify disease and patient specific biomarkers that are tractable targets for therapy.

Rossy Cancer Network

In 2012, thanks to an exceptional philanthropic act of generosity from the Rossy Family Foundation and funding commitments from foundations, the Rossy Cancer Network (RCN) was formed through a partnership of McGill University, the McGill University Health Centre, Jewish General Hospital and St. Mary's Hospital Center.

The RCN measures and reports on performance, encourages quality improvement initiatives, connects healthcare professionals, and funds research and education.

In 2018, for example, the RCN completed a special report on the Patient Experience, which represents the culmination of five years of data and over 3,000 responses to the standardized Ambulatory Oncology Patient Satisfaction Survey. In 2019, its priorities have included improving access to specialized care, harmonized tumour boards, common clinical trials, coordinated trajectories of care, and care close to home.

The Cedars Cancer Foundation, through its ongoing commitment and fundraising initiatives, is proud to support the Rossy Cancer Network's efforts to improve the outcomes of cancer patients, as well as the patient experience.

There are times in life when the meetings of minds and hearts produce something remarkable.

In 2014, Laurie Hendren, a breast cancer patient at the MUHC, was set to begin radiation therapy at the Cedars Cancer Centre. While Prof. Hendren's surgeon had told Dr. Tarek Hijal, — a radiation oncologist at the MUHC, a researcher in the Cancer Research Program at the RI-MUHC and an associate professor of oncology at McGill University —, he was about to meet someone special, he could not have anticipated what was to follow. As Dr. John Kildea, — a medical physicist at the MUHC, investigator at the RI-MUHC and assistant professor of oncology at McGill —, highlights: "the patient treated the system". Laurie had her own data and wanted to understand her diagnosis and treatment, something in today's day and age that seems an ordinary expectation from a patient. However, Laurie was far from ordinary. She had an extraordinary gift for computer science, and for succinctly establishing two problems with the healthcare system: the pain of waiting and the lack of data provided to patients. From these issues, the special bond that formed amongst Dr Hijal, Dr. Kildea and Prof. Hendren, and the tireless efforts of a development team, the Opal patient portal was born. The Cedars Cancer Foundation invested proudly in the project, supplying initial funding so that the team could get started and \$205,000 in 2018-2019.

Opal is a patient portal that lets you:

- · Check in for your appointments when you arrive at the hospital and receive an alert on your phone when your medical practitioner is ready to see you.
- · Notifications ensure that you are always up to date with your medical information.


- · View your appointment schedule. Check in and receive a notification to be called in for your appointment without waiting in the waiting room.
- · View lab results, see how they change over time and learn what they mean.
- · View clinical notes and print or share them with family members or other medical professionals.

- · Opal provides educational material tailored to your diagnosis and treatment delivered when you need it.
 - Multimedia (access booklets, factsheets and videos from your treating team)

 - Hospital information (parking information, maps and general hospital information)

Engage in Your care

- Play an active role in your care.
- Answer your treating team's questions.
- · Record your own symptoms or side effects at any time and share them with your treating team during your next visit. By recording your experiences you help your treating team better understand how your condition and your treatment are affecting you.



In Memoriam

Laurie Hendren December 13,1958 - May 27, 2019



It is with great sadness that the Opal team shares the news that Laurie Hendren, our dear friend and co-lead on the Opal project, passed away on Monday May 27th, 2019 following a brief deterioration in her illness.



Laurie was a powerful woman who had great intellect, a profound sense of fairness, and remarkable clarity of mind. She was a professor of computer science at McGill, renowned for her excellence in research and teaching. Her research centered around compilers and computer programming languages. She received numerous awards for her academic achievements and was an elected fellow of the Royal Society of Canada. Recently, she was named the 2019 recipient of the Dahl-Nygaard prize, one of the most prestigious awards in computer science. Her research was her passion and she loved to teach and share her knowledge with her students.

From the beginning, Laurie wanted to help. Following conversations about the computational needs of radiation oncology, Tarek introduced Laurie to John. The three hit it off and agreed to work together. The almost five years since have been a fun and rewarding adventure in patient involvement in research and care and in the development of the Opal patient portal. Laurie was uncompromising in her insistence that patients should have access to their medical data. She pointed out the numerous benefits this can bring to both patient and clinician. She was instrumental in the development of all aspects of Opal,

including its design, the technical details, and advocacy within the MUHC and across the province. Although still in pilot release, Opal is now being used by almost 500 patients at the Cedars Cancer Centre. Opal has received a number of awards, including a Prix de cancérologie, an honourable mention from the Washington-based Institute for Patient and Family Centered Care and the Merck Patients' First award. The Opal team proudly attended the Québec Ministry of Health and Social Services' 2019 Prix d'excellence ceremony at which Opal was recognized with the Coup de coeur des ministres award ceremony. Laurie's wish was that Opal would be available to all patients in Quebec so that all patients who desire it can access their data and play an informed role in their medical care. The Opal team is working closely with the MUHC and the MSSS to make this a reality.

It was often pointed out that Laurie was not an ordinary patient. While certainly true in many ways, Laurie would take exception to this as there is no such thing as an ordinary patient-every patient is unique and every patient should have the right to play an informed role in their own care. But Laurie was an extraordinary person. She was also a great friend to all the members of the Opal team and she will be dearly missed.

Laurie is survived by her husband Prakash Panangaden, her daughter Jane Panangaden, mother June Hendren and brother Paul Hendren to whom the Opal team express their sincere condolences.

To this, the Cedars Cancer Foundation adds that Laurie had a larger-than-life presence during her time on Earth, and her legacy will live on in the people whose lives she touched directly and in the patients whose lives the work she accomplished in collaboration with the Opal team will empower. We are honoured to continue to provide financial support to the Opal development team, as well as all initiatives that support patient empowerment.

Patient Care

Imagine that you're an architect whose firm boasts many award-winning urban projects. You are passionate about your work: the challenges, the marriage of aesthetics, functionality and safety, but also the precision and the humanism.

You're used to doing the talking. However, one day, it is you who must listen. This is not an abstract story; it belongs to Marie-Claude Lambert who, like many cancer patients, had to put her life somewhat on hold while she underwent a series of exhausting treatments for ductal breast cancer.

Despite this, Marie-Claude considers herself fortunate: "The rapidity with which I had an ultrasound, a MRI, a biopsy, and then chemotherapy, surgery, and radiation therapy surprised me. I truly felt taken in hand by the clinical team from day one. Everything was explained down to the minute detail, which was very important. However, I must

also mention the professionals and volunteers from Cedars CanSupport who gravitated around me; their warmth, encouragement and assistance were exceptional."

Approximately every 10 minutes, a Quebecer is diagnosed with cancer while someone succumbs to the disease roughly every 24 minutes. These statistics are shocking and, while progress with treatment and overall survival rates have improved, there is nevertheless a crying need for funding that will support better quality of life and outcomes in cancer, in addition to the facilities that are like a second home to those receiving cancer care.



As an architect, it is easy for me to say I admire how the light fills the Cedars Cancer Centre, but as a cancer patient, I am taken to another level of experience. I appreciate how that luminosity makes me feel every time I have to be there. It's about creating a space for healing and I am grateful for having been referred to Cedars at the MUHC.

Research

Scientists in the Cancer Research Program of the RI-MUHC delve into a plethora of cancer-related areas, including: distress, well-being, genetics, tumour expression, pathogenesis, metastases, gene microarrays, molecular biology, medical physics, epidemiology, etc.

In fiscal year 2018-2019, Cedars distributed 83 per cent of its revenues to support the MUHC, including its researchers. As the research grant environment is highly competitive, Cedars is constantly reaching out to corporations and other community pillars to fund bold, transformative research. In addition, the Cedars Cancer Foundation provided up to \$20,000 of financial support per healthcare professional so that he/she could pursue a fellowship.


Education

From visiting professors enlightening bright minds with new knowledge and/or sharpening skills, to lectures and online patient education modules, Cedars is a firm believer that education paves the way to excellence while also helping students, healthcare professionals, patients and family members not only understand cancer better, but also make better decisions.





Under the stewardship of Dr. David Fleiszer and Dr. Nancy Posel, clinical content experts, healthcare professionals and patients have collaborated to produce oncology guides for cancers of the brain, colon, esophagus, lung, prostate, thyroid, breast, endometrium, head and neck, ovaries, skin, as well as for radiotherapy, chemotherapy, pain control, fertility and equipment. As updates are necessary when advances or new knowledge surface, sustained funding is required. The Cedars Cancer Foundation thanks the community for giving generously in support of oncology guides. Using pictures, images, and animations, the guides clarify and individualize the complexities of diagnoses, treatment and patient care trajectories.





Supportive & Palliative Care

At the heart of supportive and palliative care is the word care. Patients diagnosed with treatable or advanced cancer face many challenges. As a result, we offer numerous services and programs to patients, as well as to their loved ones, as a means to guide, support, ease pain, and manage other symptoms of the disease or its treatment.

Cedars is proud to have supported in 2018-2019 the MUHC's interdisciplinary teams of healthcare professionals and volunteers go above and beyond to ensure that the physical, psychological, educational and spiritual needs of patients and their loved ones are met at every stage, from disease diagnosis and treatment to healing and end of life.

Cedars Oncology Supportive Care Centre

The Cedars Oncology Supportive Care Centre is being developed adjacent to the Cedars Cancer Centre at the Glen site. It will consolidate and improve existing programs and services in one location and will continue to offer a comprehensive approach to care that goes beyond surgery, chemotherapy, radiation therapy and new treatments. It will provide for patients who are either living with cancer as a chronic disease or have received treatment and/or are disease free. The physical, psychological, emotional and spiritual aspects of healing will all be addressed. This Centre will also be a much-needed hub of research. Fundraising is under way.





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
Flagship Events

Cedars CanSupport

Cedars CanSupport is a program at the McGill University Health Centre under the Cancer Care Mission's Supportive and Palliative Care Division. In collaboration with the healthcare team, a dedicated group of professionals and volunteers provide complementary emotional support, educational services, therapies, practical resources and humanitarian aid. Our services are for patients in active or post treatment; those living with advanced cancer and/ or receiving end-of-life care; for their family and friends and/or bereaved loved ones.

In 2018-2019, 4,655 patients benefited from practical services and 2,475 individuals from educational services. Over 1,200 patients participated in special workshops, such as post-breast-surgery yoga, while over 1,100 in activities such as art, music and massage therapy, mindfulness, and gentle yoga. Over 8,000 patients and family members used the Cedars CanSupport resource centre, which houses a concentration of helpful guides and educational materials. Finally, over \$142,000 in humanitarian aid were distributed to over 700 patients, who were unable to manage the financial burden brought on by cancer, for food, rent, medication, transportation, and utilities.

Cedars CanSupport relies entirely on donor contributions to fund its programs and services.







13th Edition of the FL Fuller Landau **Dragon Boat Race & Festival**

Over 1,000 participants and over \$440,000 collected!

The paddlers' village buzzed with enthusiasm, as teams took part in two qualifying races before lunch and a final race in the afternoon. However, winning on the water wasn't the only goal, as each boat strove to outdo each other's fundraising totals. Top teams collected over \$62,000 for Cedars CanSupport. The Camp Nominingue Alumni Dragons reclaimed the winning title from the Dusty Paddles in an exciting final race by 8/100th of a second.

Founded in 2006, the Dragon Boat Race & Festival began with six boats and \$12,000 raised and has grown to an event of more than 25 boats, with over \$6 million raised to date. Accounting firm FL Fuller Landau celebrated their 11th anniversary for the 2018 edition, as the presenting sponsor of the festival, and it also took pride in being active participants. Funds raised are donated to the Cedars CanSupport program, which provides psychological, practical, and humanitarian assistance, as well as support services for cancer patients and their families at the MUHC.




33rd Annual Raffle and Auction Soirée at Le Windsor

3rd Run for Ovarian Cancer

Over \$195,000 collected for leading-edge diagnostics and care!

The Cedars Run for Ovarian Cancer was held on Sunday, October 14, in the Town of Mount Royal. Founded by ovarian cancer survivor and avid long-distance runner Dominique Dagenais, the Run raises money and awareness for the Detecting Ovarian and Endometrial Cancers Early (DOVEE) Project, a leading-edge ovarian cancer research program based at the MUHC.

Dr. Lucy Gilbert is the Director of Gynecologic Cancer Services at the MUHC, a professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology and Oncology at McGill University, and the founder of the DOvEE Project. She was at the Run to talk about her work and to cheer participants.

Dr. Gilbert and her team recently developed a new test, PapSEEK, in collaboration with researchers from Johns Hopkins University that provides a safe and minimally-invasive method of detecting ovarian and endometrial cancers at an earlier stage than was previously possible. Although it is not yet available to patients, it is a critical step toward improving survival rates.





2nd Annual Ride for Hope & Gratitude

\$116,000 collected for leading-edge cell therapy/immunotherapy program!

Cheered on by family and friends, 32 riders enjoyed a glorious weekend from September 21 to 23, riding in the Ottawa River Valley as part of the 2nd Annual Cedars Ride for Hope and Gratitude in support of the Hematology-Oncology Cell Therapy for Blood Cancers at the MUHC.

Rob Callard, a cancer survivor and the driving force behind the ride is being treated by Dr. Pierre Laneuville and his leading-edge program. Cell therapy/immunotherapy has shown promise in the treatment of blood cancers and other applications and is being utilized as an alternative to certain forms of chemotherapy. By establishing a new Cell Therapy Unit under the direction of Dr. Pierre Laneuville, doctors, researchers and patients will benefit from this burgeoning area of research in the fight against cancer.





Joint Foundation Initiatives

Inaugural Gala Benefiting the Cedars Cancer Centre

Over 560 participants and over \$1.2 million collected!

The Cedars Cancer Centre Inaugural Gala was organized in support of leading-edge oncologic research, patient care and education. The December 6th gala attracted over 560 people, including members of the community, corporations, MUHC, McGill University, and Rossy Cancer Network-affiliated leaders, healthcare professionals and partners. National Bank of Canada President and CEO, Louis Vachon, served as Honorary Event Chair while Diana Ferrara Scalia, Paola Aprikian and Daphne Tsadilas Shamie co-chaired the winter wonderland extravaganza orchestrated by Nadia Saputo.

In addition, the Gala celebrated the exceptional women and men who represent every division of oncology and the Cancer Research Program of the Research Institute of the MUHC, shining a spotlight on the importance of donor contributions in an era of diminishing national investment. During the event, Board Co-Chair Bruce Shadeed confirmed that the Gala had tipped the \$50-million capital campaign over the \$10-million milestone.

Some highlights for 2018-2019

Rad.Onc.Bra — An Invention that Changes Lives

In April 2018, the Cedars Cancer Foundation partnered with The CURE Foundation and 'The Bell' Fund to ensure patients can use the Rad.Onc.Bra, a revolutionary medical accessory developed at the MUHC that protects women's breasts from burns during radiation therapy. The Rad.Onc.Bra is the brainchild of MUHC radiation-oncology technologists Nancie Raffis and Suzanne Rossel, who were upset about seeing their patients suffer and decided to do something about it back in 2010.

"We knew that placing a breast higher on the chest wall during radiotherapy treatments had been shown to alleviate these painful side effects," says Rossel. "With that in mind, we set-out to design a medical accessory that would optimize the positioning of the breast, immobilize it, and therefore reduce unnecessary burning, inflammation and dermatitis."



Raffis and Rossel teamed up with Diane Rousseau, a medical garment specialist who creates compressive garments for lymphedema patients. Together, they developed and tested prototypes, as part of a research protocol in collaboration with Cedars Cancer Centre's radiation oncologists. For the next five years, with the financial support of Cedars and 'The Bell' Fund, the Rad.Onc.Bra was tested, improved, and made less costly to manufacture, more user-friendly for radiation oncology technologists and even more effective for patients. Finally, in 2017, the Rad.Onc.Bra was officially ready.

"One of my patients underwent radiotherapy without the Rad.Onc.Bra, and, years later, with the Rad.Onc.Bra," adds Raffis. "The difference was like night and day. She had severe burns the first time and none the second time."

Soirée en Or — Benefiting the Program for Innovative Therapeutics in Chest and Esophago-Gastric Cancers

Cedars Cancer Foundation joined forces again with the Montreal General Hospital Foundation in 2018 to co-host the 2nd edition of the Soirée en Or gala benefiting the Program for Innovative Therapeutics in Chest and Esophago-Gastric Cancers. This Program is part of the McGill Division of Thoracic Surgery and is based at the Montreal General Hospital of the MUHC. As one of the largest thoracic surgical oncology programs in North America, the MUHC team delivers cutting-edge care to patients suffering from lung, esophagus and stomach cancers from Montreal, as well as regions across Quebec and Eastern Canada. Surgery is conducted at the Montreal General Hospital while medical oncology and radiation oncology services are delivered in the Cedars Cancer Centre. In raising \$2.7 million in 2018, the event and other related activities during the year are having a huge impact on patients' lives.



Origin House Founder Marc Lustig sets new goal for Medical Cannabis Research and Care

In December 2018, Cedars announced that the Lustig Family Medical Cannabis Research and Care Fund achieved its \$250,000 goal and that a new \$1 million target over four years had been set by Origin House founder Marc Lustig. This Fund supports a best-in-class medical cannabis program as part of the Division of Supportive and Palliative Care at the MUHC, as well as vital research, training and education. A first-of-its-kind in Canada medical cannabis therapy pilot project was launched in January 2018 with support from the Cedars Cancer Foundation and the Rossy Cancer Network's Quality Improvement Initiatives Fund.

"Medical cannabis can alleviate pain and the significant side effects that accompany cancer, such as loss of appetite, anxiety and insomnia," stated Dr. Antonio Vigano, Director of the Cancer Rehabilitation Program at the MUHC, Associate Professor of Oncology at McGill and a Principal Investigator in two medical cannabis clinical trials. "Improving access, adjusting type, dose and the frequency of cannabinoid treatments through a precision-medicine approach, studying the long-term outcomes and assuring appropriate training for healthcare professionals are necessary. This is why the Lustig Family Medical Cannabis Research and Care Fund is so critical."

Other noteworthy collaborative initiatives included:

To raise awareness and funds for the Prostate Cancer Research Fund under the leadership of Dr. Simon Tanguay, MUHC Urologist-in-Chief, Juan Manuel Alonso and Luis Nasim, who have family members and close friends affected by the disease, completed a cycling journey that took them from Victoria, BC to St. John's, NL (over 8,000 km) in a period of 100 days. They raised \$104,362.

Men's Health Day

One in seven men in Canada will one day be given a prostate cancer diagnosis. Prostate cancer can be slow-growing, and some men may live many years before cancer is detected. Regular screening is therefore vital. The 2018 edition of MUHC Men's Health Day, under the leadership of Dr. Peter Chan, was a resounding success. More than 280 men were seen by doctors and nurses at outside clinics.

Carol for a Cure

Since 2009, Team RockStarr has gathered for holiday carolling to honour the memory of Rochelle Barr, and in celebration, remembrance, and support of breast cancer fighters everywhere. Over \$175,000 have been collected and allocated to the Cedars Breast Cancer Program, which supports access to a Breast Cancer Nurse Navigator who offers guidance to patients through all stages of their cancer journey.

Holt Shopping Night

Holt Renfrew once again opened its doors to the Montreal community for a one of a kind stylish Charitable Shopping Night, where 10 percent of all sales from the evening were donated to the Cedars Cancer Foundation.

Montelle Special Edition Wire-free Bra

In October 2018, Montelle Intimates announced it would donate \$10 from the sale of each Special Edition Wire-free Bra to the Cedars Cancer Centre via the Cedars Cancer Foundation to raise awareness about breast cancer and the fight for a cure. A Community with Purpose



Each Comfort Kit contains:

- · A soft fleece blanket with a foot pocket
- A reusable water bottle for taking medication
- · A notebook and pen to jot down the instructions given by doctors and nurses
- · Mints to soothe sore throats and mitigate the metallic taste that can be a side-effect of chemo
- A magazine to pass the time

Since its founding, 'The Bell' Fund has raised more than a million dollars, and continues to see support flow into this vital initiative driven by and for our patients.










Fiscal Year 2018-2019 Revenues

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
