



A GUINNESS WORLD RECORD WAS JUST THE START

A Cedars Hero is someone who goes above and beyond for patients and their families, in support of our mission to offer every cancer patient at the MUHC compassionate care that focuses on them as a person, not on their disease. This year, we would like to highlight the achievements of Samuel Finn.

Last year Samuel laid his heart out in honour of his late brother Cédric, who succumbed at the age of 27 to sarcoma, a rare form of cancer that affects 1% to 2% of the population. Samuel performed 5,234 chest-to-floor burpees in 12 hours, setting a new Guinness World Record while raising over \$60,000 for the Cédric Finn Fund at the Cedars Cancer Foundation.

Samuel maintained a rigorous training regimen for the six months leading up to the challenge and set an incredible pace as he jumped up and dropped to the mat 5,234 times. Cedars is proud to have been there to witness his achievement and is honoured to steward the Cédric Finn Fund benefiting sarcoma research.

KEEPING CÉDRIC FINN'S MEMORY ALIVE

"The Cedars Cancer Foundation is honoured to have Samuel Finn as an Ambassador," stated Jeff J. Shamie, President and CEO of Cedars. "In achieving his goal, Samuel has done himself and his brother's memory proud because philanthropy will help save lives. His ongoing commitment is a real inspiration."



The McGill University Health Centre (MUHC) is one of a handful of centres in Canada with both the ultra-specialized teams and necessary experience to diagnose and treat sarcoma. With the rarity of cases, research is crucial, which is why scientists in the Research Institute of the MUHC are working tirelessly to generate new knowledge and therapies.

"Cancer also affects every aspect of a person's life," added Shamie. "Cedars is dedicated to funding programs and services to meet the emotional, physical, psychosocial, spiritual and even humanitarian needs of cancer patients and their families."

My big brother Ced lost his life to a Sarcoma cancer at only 27 years old. I challenged myself to beat the Guinness World Record for the most chest-to-ground burpees in 12 hours to honor his courage and to raise funds for the Cedars Cancer Foundation - Cédric Finn Fund.

TRAINING FOR A NEW CHALLENGE

This year, Samuel continues the push, and is helping raise awareness not only for the Cédric Finn Fund, but also for the Cedars Covid-19 Humanitarian Fund for Paediatric and Adult Cancer Patients and their families - which provides assistance and resources for cancer patients, and their families, in financial need. As part of a philosophy that involves the entire cancer treatment journey, Cedars' goal is to alleviate the negative impact of financial hardship, while reducing the stress associated with life's basic necessities such as shelter, groceries, utilities, and transportation costs.

When asked what this connection to Cedars Cancer Foundation means to him, Samuel remarked, "Just as my Guinness World Record was a team achievement, so too is the battle against cancer. I am inspired by what the Foundation's team does to help humanize the cancer treatment journey, and I am motivated to continue engaging people in Cédric's memory."

CEDARS CANSUPPORT



Cedars CanSupport is a program at the McGill University Health Centre under the Cancer Care Mission's Supportive and Palliative Care Division. Cedars CanSupport relies entirely on donor contributions to fund its programs and services.

Scientific advances have dramatically improved the landscape of cancer care and cancer survivorship. However, what has not changed is the human side of cancer. A diagnosis of cancer can still shock and shake every aspect of an individual's life and worldview. Cedars CanSupport exists to alleviate the extraordinary burden carried by patients diagnosed with cancer and their families, one person at a time. The raison d'etre of this non-profit, hospital-based organization is to provide emotional, educational, practical, navigational, and financial assistance to cancer patients and their families. CCS is there at the front lines of patient care, all year round, across the lifespan, from diagnosis onwards, when the patient was ready.

The COVID19 state of emergency added to the extraordinary challenge of facing cancer at a distance. However, the year 2020-2021 was no different in terms of offering compassionate services and emotional support. For the first time in 33 years, the CCS offices closed following government mandated guidelines. In lieu of the usual on-site, foot traffic from the team of dedicated staff and volunteers in the Cedars Cancer Centre, a healthy online presence emerged thanks to the CCS team who quickly reorganized themselves to learn to navigate a new world of telehealth, videoconferencing and remote workflow processes.

A total of 594 virtual participations in Gentle Yoga, Meditate, Relax, and Breathe, Distance Reiki, Virtual Art Therapy workshops, Facing Cancer at a Distance Patient Support Groups, and collaborative workshops with Montreal Museum of Fine Arts and Look Good Feel Better.

At the CCS Resource Centre, 5,248 individuals benefitted at a distance from practical, educational, and emotional support and assistance via email, telephone and on-site health care providers at the Cedars Cancer Centre.



In addition, \$101,374 was distributed in humanitarian aid to 480 patients and families to meet the basic costs of living such as food, rent, utilities, or unplanned out of pocket expenses created by the financial burden of cancer such as medications or transportation to and from appointments.

As we move forward, a hybrid model representing both online and on-site programs and services will improve access and provide for a better representation of our community hospital population. This will sustain a culture of engagement, participation, acceptability and accessibility while continuing to provide a platform of hope and support.


GOING BEYOND FOR CANCER PATIENTS AND THEIR FAMILIES

HOW WE HAVE PUT THIS INTO FORCE:

- No more single-use water bottles at any events. We have discouraged their use by participants, and have created refill stations using filtered water. We also offer refillable bottles to participants.
- We have challenged our suppliers to source earth-friendly options.
- Each event gets a sustainability pre-audit and post-audit to ensure the maximum reuse of previously created collateral materials, signage, and give-aways, and to see where we can improve our practices.
- Food providers are asked to source locally and to use compostable packaging when needed.
- We have seen a marked decrease in the amount of waste at our in-person events, and have embraced online/virtual options where feasible.
- We have decreased the quantity of printed materials while maintaining a high level of sponsor and brand awareness pre, during, and post events.
- Foundation audit was performed and purchasing/sourcing has been adjusted accordingly.




ALLOCATIONS




CEDARS VIRTUAL RUN FOR OVARIAN CANCER

FUNDS

FRANK RANA'S SUPPORTIVE CARE ANNUAL CAMPAIGN

Frank and Mary Rana have been part of the Friends for the Cure Committee since 2003 and Frank was also a member of the Cedars Board of Directors, where he led our Finance Corporate Fundraising Committees for many years.

In 2010, Frank Rana rallied his friends, family and corporate colleagues around a cause that is very close to his heart. Thanks to his leadership and direction, over \$3.5 million has been raised to fund Cedars Supportive Care programs and Cedars CanSupport. These vital funds have helped Cedars improve the quality of life for cancer patients as it provides free psychological, emotional, spiritual support, practical information and financial assistance for our patients at the MUHC.

LUSTIG FAMILY MEDICAL CANNABIS RESEARCH & CARE FUND

This fund seeks donations to support the establishment of a best-in-class medical cannabis programme for cancer patients in the Cedars Oncology Supportive Care Centre at the MUHC. The Lustig family have set up a matching gift program.

Funds will be channelled into 3 areas:

- The establishment of a best-in-class medical cannabis programme for cancer patients at the MUHC in the new Cedars Oncology Supportive Care Centre:
- Training and education on medicinal use of on Sarah's Floor at the Montreal Child cannabis for healthcare professionals working for their Pediatric Comfort Kit initiative. in oncology; and
- Developing and carrying out clinical trials on medicinal cannabis for pain and symptom control in cancer patients.

CÉDRIC FINN FUND

The Cédric Finn Fund, has been created by his mother Nathalie Lapierre and his family in memory of their beloved son and brother, Cedric Finn, to advocate for sarcoma patients by funding research and by increasing awareness about the disease.







KIM WINNICKI LEGACY FUND

As an oncology nurse at the legacy site of the Royal Victoria Hospital for nearly 40 years, Kim dedicated her career to helping cancer patients and their families. She was an exceptional role model to nurses and other healthcare professionals, and a constant source of support and compassion for those in her care. The collaboration she created between the clinical team and families was invaluable, while her laughter, positive demeanor and the beauty she saw in the world around her touched patients and staff alike.

Kim's late husband, Wojtek, and her sons have set up the Kim Winnicki Legacy Fund to make a lasting contribution in Kim's honour to advance Oncology-Hematology Nursing Education, Research and Practice, including financial support for nurses to attend continuing medical education conferences, workshops and seminars.

'THE BELL' FUND

The 'Bell Fund', a grassroots program that has seen already in excess of 4,500 cancer patients supplied with a free comfort kit, was launched on February 4, 2016, World Cancer Day, in a sunny atrium at the Glen site of the MUHC. Judy Martin, indefatigable founder, accompanied by her treatment team, rang a ship's bell she donated in 2013 to celebrate the completion of her chemotherapy. The bell is engraved with the words Lucky, Grateful, Hopeful.

The goal of the fund is to give every newly-diagnosed MUHC cancer patient a Comfort Kit. 'The Bell' Fund is raising funds to make this a reality. 'The Bell' Fund also provides a soft blanket for every newly diagnosed child on Sarah's Floor at the Montreal Children's Hospital for their Pediatric Comfort Kit initiative.
