

The Rule of Faith: Being Human in God's World Affirmation 5 - Hope

Various Scriptures



- 1. The introduction to the message included a quote from C. S. Lewis' Mere Christianity, "If you read history you will find that the Christians who did most for the present world were precisely those who thought most of the next. It is since Christians have largely ceased to think of the other world that they have become so ineffective in this." What's your perspective on why people have "largely ceased to think of the other world"?
- 2. Take a look at 2 Peter 1:4 and 1 Corinthians 1:20 again and talk about how we both believe the promises of God and often act like we don't.
- 3. In Revelation 1:5b-8 we have the promise of Christ's coming, and for those of us who believe, we acknowledge that this is the only thing that will truly satisfy us. In Lewis' words, this is "the most probable explanation" for all of our longings; namely that we were "made for another world." In what way do you see unbelievers in your life trying to fill that longing in other ways?
- 4. Think about your first moments in eternity. You've just died and passed into "heaven." What will those first moments be like? What will you do?
- 5. Holiness and service are the natural by-products of genuine faith. It is not a stretch to say that any professing Christian who is unconcerned with holiness and has no heart to serve (build up and reach out) has no claim to be saved. If this is true for you, what might need to change in your life to get to a better place?
- 6. What of "life's worst" might you be facing right now that you could use prayer from your fellow Life Group members to help you get a glimpse of Eden, as Tolkien suggested?
- 7. We wrote two creeds that match the five affirmations in *The Rule of Faith*. Recite one or the other before you break for prayer.

The Rule of Faith Creed Short Form

We believe in one God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Creator and sustainer of all things, who speaks with final and sufficient authority through the inspired Scriptures.

We believe God made humanity in his image, male and female, with dignity, value, and purpose, to know him, reflect him, and live under his loving rule.

We grieve the reality of our ruin, knowing we are in crisis.
Born in sin, corrupted in heart, and separated from God, unable to save ourselves.

We believe Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God, took on human flesh, lived in perfect obedience, died as our substitute, bearing the wrath our sin deserved, and that by grace alone, through faith alone may we be forgiven.

We believe in the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ Because he rose, we have power Because he reigns, we have victory Because he renews, we have life Because he lives in us, we are on mission. Restored to reflect the image of Christ and sent to live for the glory of God.

We believe Jesus will come again in power and glory.
Until that day, we rest in the sure and certain hope of his return.
Confident in every promise,
committed to holiness and service,
and encouraged through this life's worst.
