Proposal — *Gananoque After Dark: Our History on the Waterfront*

Proposal for consideration by the Gananoque Heritage Advisory Panel

I would like to propose that the Heritage Advisory Panel explore the feasibility of using the large exterior wall of the **Gananoque Waterworks Pump House, 110 Kate Street**, facing the marina, as a location for an evening heritage projection program.

The Gananoque Waterworks Pump House is itself an important part of the Town's heritage. Constructed between 1903 and 1905 as Gananoque's first municipal waterworks project, the building retains an important presence on the waterfront and has been recognized for its historical, architectural and contextual significance.

The wall facing the marina is highly visible and provides a large, relatively unobstructed surface that is currently illuminated by exterior spotlights. The concept would be to temporarily turn off or reduce the existing lighting during designated projection periods and use a suitably located and secured projector to display historical images of Gananoque on the wall. The appropriate location for the projector would be determined in consultation with Town staff, taking into consideration electrical infrastructure, required clearances, public safety, security and projection quality.

The project could draw upon historical photographs from the Town's archives and other local collections to tell the story of Gananoque and its waterfront. Images might include historic views of the harbour and waterfront, early industries and businesses, boats and vessels associated with the Thousand Islands, historic buildings and streetscapes, community events, and photographs of residents from earlier generations. If suitable historical film or video footage exists and the necessary permissions can be obtained, short film segments could also eventually be incorporated.

Rather than simply displaying individual photographs, the images could be assembled into a curated presentation telling a particular story about Gananoque. Different programs could potentially be developed over time—for example, **Gananoque's Waterfront Through the Years**, **Life on the St. Lawrence**, or **Then and Now: Gananoque in Photographs**.

The presentation could operate for approximately one hour beginning at dusk on selected evenings. A program of still photographs with brief captions could run continuously during that period, allowing residents, visitors and people walking along the waterfront to stop and watch for as long as they wish.

The program could be presented under the title:

Gananoque After Dark: Our History on the Waterfront

I suggest that the Heritage Advisory Panel initially investigate this as a **pilot project**. The first phase would determine the appropriate projector and equipment, electrical requirements, projector location and security, the ability to temporarily control the existing exterior lighting, image quality and visibility from the waterfront, and any operational or safety considerations. Copyright and permission requirements for archival photographs and film would also need to be confirmed.

If feasible, funding for the pilot could be considered from the Heritage Advisory Panel's existing budget. A relatively modest initial investment could establish whether the concept is successful before the Town considers a more permanent installation.

The objective would be to create a simple and visually engaging way of bringing Gananoque's history into a public space. The location is particularly appropriate because the waterfront has played such an important role in the Town's history—and because the Waterworks Pump House is itself part of that history. Instead of installing another physical interpretive structure, an existing heritage building could become a temporary canvas through which Gananoque's history is shared.

If successful, the project could eventually become a regular summer heritage feature and could be refreshed periodically with different themes and material from Gananoque's historical collections.

Recommended next step: That the Heritage Advisory Panel authorize an initial feasibility investigation and costing for a one-evening pilot of **Gananoque After Dark: Our History on the Waterfront**, using the marina-facing wall of the Gananoque Waterworks Pump House.
